V. the conserve of the st. of the clove-gilliflower is very cordiall and exhilarating, it h. hot pestifentiall fevers, and expelleth the poyson; and fury of the disease. The wild *Caryophyllus sivestris.* K. as the single purple pinks, (single red, white jagged, large white jagged, purple jagged, white wild jagged, wild purple jagged, Clusius's mountain, and dwarf, leafless, white mountain, Deprford, Maiden, small mountain broad leaved, white mountain, mild sea, broad leaved wild, and white campion pink. T. are of the temper of Carnarions. V. they are not used in physick. Fuch. the root preventeth the plague, its juyce h. the stone, and falling-sickness. Pak. K. as the great old, Camberisze, Primula, Bradshawe dainty Lady, Oxford, granper, tawny, and Tuggies gilliflow double and matted pink. T. V. as the rest. *Syrupus infusionis florum Caryophyllorum,* Pharm. Lond. Or, *Syrup of clove gilliflowers,* is very Temperate, strengthens the heart, liver, and stomach, and refresheth the vicall spirits. It is a good cordiall in fevers, and usually mixed with others, and is a harnelch syrup, Schrad. the Decoction of the extract, is ser. sem. to drach. sem.

**Carrot. Ger. J. K.** as the yellow, and red. T. the root of the yellow is temperately hot and something moist, of little nourishment, and that not very good, it's not so windic as the turnep, nor passeth so soon through the belly. The red is of like faculty, the seed of

*Sax* is hot and dry. V. the seed breaketh and containeth windines and provoketh urine, as that of the wild carrot. The root is usually boyled with fat flesh and eaten. The *wild carrot*, or *bees uells pastinaca sylvestris rennifolia*. T. the seed and root is hot and dry 2<sup>o</sup>, and opening. V. the root boyled and eaten, or boyled in wine, and the decoction d. provoketh urine, expells the birch, and c. venery. The *seed* d. provoketh the reins, and urine: h. the wind, dropple, collick, and stone, d. in wine. It h. the mother and conception, and bitings of venomous beasts. *Candy carrots*, *Daucus creticus*. T. the seed is hot and dry 3<sup>o</sup>. V. the seed d. h. the strangury, dysury, gravell, and stone, and provoketh urine: it h. gripings of the belly, windc, collick, and old coughs. d. in wine it expelleth poyson: the root d. in wine stops lacte and h. poyson. *Stinking carrots* or *deadly*, *Thapsia*. K. as the *stinking*, *small leaved stinking*, and *deadly*: *Thapsia*. E. V. the root c. gripings, cramps and convulsions. The *wild Pars*. K. as the *mountaine of Hungary*, *mountain fine leaved*, the *tree of Candy*, *low mountain parfly*, and *coriauder leaved* &c. V. the root h. coughs.
